Blueprint 2020

September 2016/17 sees the fourth year of our dynamic six year school development strategy. This innovative and far ranging plan will bring our school to the next level in terms of learning and services to our community.

In this section we want to share some of our key strategic goals for the year ahead and then focus in on a few of the key innovations. Over the next year we will regularly report on what has been achieved and the new projects that we develop.

Strategic Leadership

To share good practice across the school and beyond to enhance staff development and pupils' attainment. This will include the development and coaching of curriculum leaders;

The continued development of Shared Education with St. James's Primary School. In particular, this will allow the schools to promote S.T.E.M. and Forest School learning as well as achieving 'Rights Respecting Schools' status;

To engage with community stakeholders to increase aspirations, attainment, early intervention and collaboration. This will include focused family learning support interventions.

Ethos

Implement and review a whole school wellbeing strategy;

Achieve the British Council's International School Award by June 2018;

Use the pursuit of the Eco Green Flag, by June 2019, as a means to educate our school community to be more eco friendly.

Learning and Teaching

90+% of pupils, in both, Literacy and Numeracy will achieve as expected or above;

I.C.T. will more effectively enrich creativity, thinking skills and improve school management;

Review and update our P.D.M.U. provision.

November Update:

The big focus in October was in developing our **new outdoor learning zone**. We have been working closely with our school council, the Education Authority and Antrim and Newtownabbey Council in getting our plans together. In November we will be **launching a competition amongst the children to name the new area.** By March 2017 we would hope to have Phase 1 completed. This will be a £30,000 start to a project that will continue for five years. In total we are planning to invest around £100,000 by June 2020 in a fantastic resource for our pupils and our community.

We also had fantastic news from the **Shared Education Project**. Over the next three years we are to be provided with additional resources to allow for more collaboration across the two schools. It would be our intention to use this investment to **develop curriculum and learning across the schools**. The aim of Shared Education is to build friendships and partnership in our community. There is, however, a clear expectation that the work must also **improve pupils' learning and attainment**. This is a goal that we are enthusiastically pursuing!

Launch of our new School Development Plan



On Wednesday 12th October, **to celebrate the launch of the new school development plan,** over <u>300 pupils and parents</u> came along to watch a fantastic presentation of **'Beauty & the Beast'**.

The pupils were also given their own child-friendly guide to the next three years. The parents were not left out as they were also presented with a more detailed booklet outlining the school's aspirations for the coming school development cycle.

Some of our school governors, including Mrs Baillie (Chairperson of the Board of Governors), were there to welcome families and thank them for their input into the consultation process that helped shape the school development plan.

Two of the pupils even dressed up to get into the spirit of the evening's celebrations. Mrs Baillie met with them and personally handed over their booklets.

The evening was a great success. As everyone headed home they had memories of a lovely evening and hopefully, in true Disney fashion, dreams of what is yet to come! As Walt reminded his guests, 'If you can dream it, you can do it.

Talking Points: Attendance

Every month we would like to share an educational issue with our families. The need for parents and teachers to be on the 'same page' is so important to help our pupils reach their full potential. My hope is that parents would find this information useful and thought provoking. We are also very keen for parents to respond with their comments to us. This month we want to discuss the importance of high attendance. This year so far we have a very pleasing level of attendance. At present we have a <u>98.1%</u> attendance rate.

Here are some facts and research about the link between attendance and achievement:

- 1 A child who is absent a day of school per week misses an equivalent of two years of their school life;
- 2 Research shows that missing 10 percent of the school negatively affects pupils' performance;
- 3 Poor attendance can **influence whether children read proficiently** by the end of Year 5;

4 90% of young people with absence rates below **85% fail to achieve five or more good grades of GCSE** and around **one third achieve no GCSEs at all**;

5 Poor examination results limit young people's options and **poor attendance suggests to colleges and employers that these students are unreliable.**

As a school we do not apologise for expecting high standards and challenging poor attendance. You can see from the research how important high attendance is for pupils' learning.

As a school we would strive for a 97% end of year attendance level. For each pupil 95% would be considered <u>only</u> satisfactory (no more than 8 days off per year.)

We need to stress, however, that we accept there are very genuine cases when a child is ill or there are extraordinary circumstances when a child's attendance will be below 95%. If this is the case then we as a school are very understanding and supportive.

If your child's attendance <u>falls below 90%</u> you will be contacted and an intervention is likely to be applied. This can involve a tracking process and even the involvement of an Educational Welfare Officer.

A worrying issue is families taking **holidays during term time**. It is unfair on your child, disruptive for other pupils in the class (time taken to help your child/children catch up) and difficult for already very hard working teachers. Please try to avoid these holidays!
